- 4) Equations must be editable (Use Microsoft or math type)
- 5) Units (SI unites are highly encouraged)
- 6) Use Zero before any decimal point (Eg. 0.12)

4. Conclusion

- 1) Conclusion should summarize the key results, suggestions and applications of the paper and it should not resemble the abstract.
- 2) Do not include References
- 3) The conclusion must be between 250-350 words.

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References

The reference is a list of reference / references is not a bibliography, thus, should contain all sources referred to in the manuscript; no need to contain unassigned sources. The reference list contains all references in the text derived from sources that are (a) relevant, (b) at least 80% are recent studies (last 10 years), and (c) at least 80% are primary studies, particularly from journal articles). The reference in *AJBRI* refers to the American Psychological Association (APA) 6^{Ed} style to be followed.
